Two sisters reside on Convent Avenue, just two blocks apart. They're beautiful and proud. They're a well-kept secret of Harlem. They grace the place with their endearing charm. They brighten the neighborhood with their sunny dispositions and innate sense of style. They're friendly and fun. People say they're quite similar, but different in interesting ways.

17 Convent stands on the corner of a quiet leafy street
near the top of a gently rising hill. Its subtle
tri-toned brick façade and generous windows
create a welcoming presence.

The building's serial setbacks obey the angle of the street, granting each home extra privacy and superior views. Penthouses sit atop the building like a crown — their floor-to-ceiling walls of glass serve as a nighttime beacon by sending a guiding light to neighbors and passers-by.

52 Convent is the sister building of 17 Convent. From its
higher mount a block further up the sloping Avenue,
the building's oversized windows frame artful views
of the neighborhood and beyond — some vistas extend
all the way to the Hudson River and New Jersey.

Occupying the corner of 129th Street, the building has
exposures on three sides and enjoys exceptional
light and air.



The spacious lobby makes coming and going an everyday pleasure. Its warm-toned mix of wood and stone is calming and elegant. The custom-made wall map of the neighborhood brings an artistic touch to an already beautiful space. The seating area provides an island of comfort when awaiting the arrival of a friend or taxi. A Virtual Doorman assists with visitors and deliveries around the clock, every day
